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## **Another Blow Relating to the Saint-Hubert Airport**

**Longueuil, October 1, 2021** — The management problems at the Saint-Hubert Airport raised by Jean-Marc Léveillé continue to generate a lot of ink. Today, an article in La Presse reveals a conflict between Développement de l'Aéroport de Saint-Hubert — Longueuil (DASH-L) and the École nationale d'aérotechnique (ÉNA).

In an email reported by the journalist, the Chairman of the Board of Directors of DASH-L, Charles Vaillancourt, would have stressed that the land of the ÉNA is "extremely strategic for the airport - which wishes to attract low-cost carriers in order to to offer domestic flights and to sun destinations - because it is located on the edge of the runway." "By not recognizing the strategic value of the ÉNA, Mr. Vaillancourt confirms once again that DASH-L has no vision for economic development. Without a lease since 2018, the development of the school has been paralyzed for 3 years by the conflict. The ÉNA is even at risk of losing its facilities. It's totally irresponsible! DASH-L is jeopardizing the leadership position of one of our largest Québec aeronautical institutions for discount carriers." - Jean-Marc Léveillé.

Also, according to the article, the Québec Council of Ministers adopted on April 9 a decree to expropriate DASH-L from the land where the ÉNA is located, a procedure that DASH-L is now contesting. In the eyes of the mayoral candidate, this confirms that the only approach DASH-L understands is that of force.

"For 4 years, DASH-L has shown no real openness to dialogue with anyone. Even the Council of Ministers of the Government of Québec is forced to go into expropriation to save a jewel of aeronautics. There is a serious problem with the management of the airport. If I am elected on November 7, the Government of Québec will find an ally with our team. DASH-L must understand that they need the City of Longueuil much more than we need them to intelligently develop the airport area." - Jean-Marc Léveillé.
